This, in addition to Rio's culture so accurately portrayed, led me to believe that everyone involved in the show really cares about expressing the beauty and importance of diversity to their audience.

The show's writing very gracefully covered the abuse that Nancí had dealt with, a topic that such a young audience might find difficult to understand.

Ella Saldana North's portrayal of the character, Oli, had me smiling throughout the entire show. I think I can speak for everyone else in the audience when I say that each character made a massive impact.

I found myself laughing out loud each time Oli "stopped the show" to speak to the "director". It was a bit that I had never seen before and found quite entertaining.
